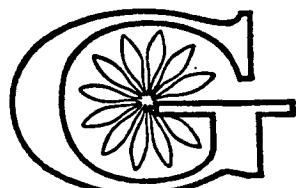
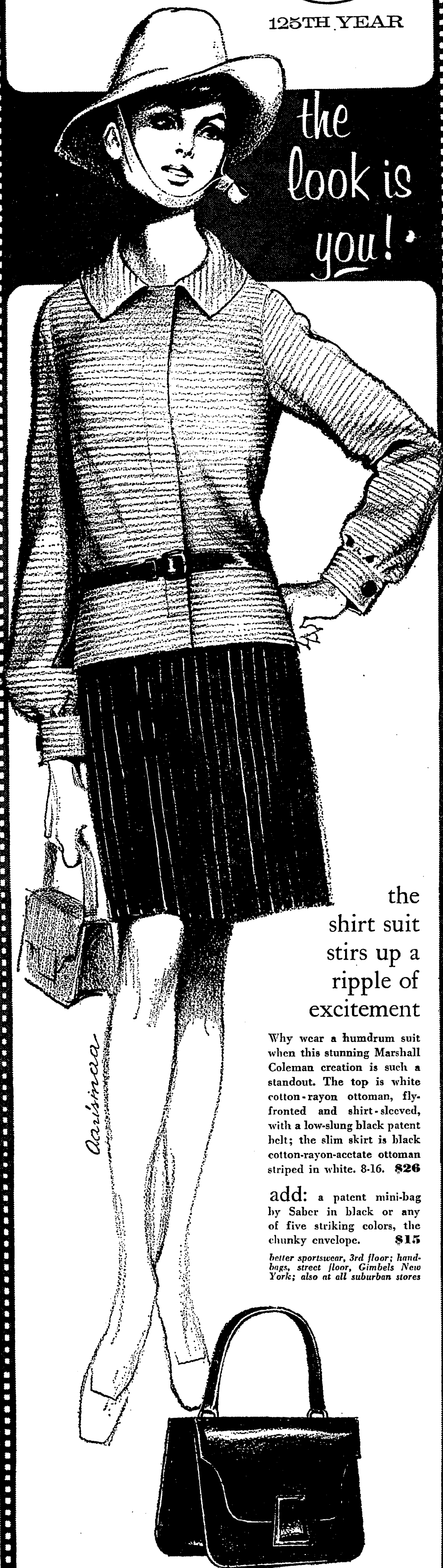


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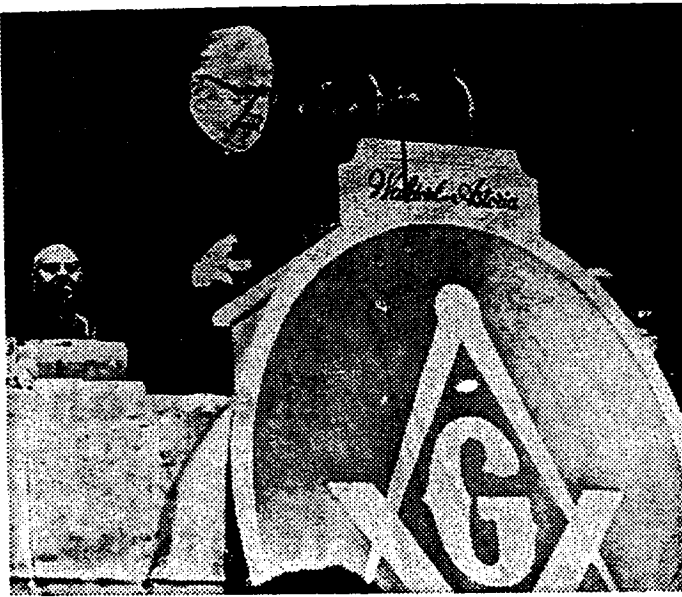

Masons Cheer Talk by Jesuit, The First Such Address Here

"I wish that Good Pope John and Jews but not Catholics, could see me now—a poor, defenseless Jesuit taking his life in his hands before thousands of Free and Accepted Masons. He would have loved it. This is the way he wanted things to happen.

With these words, the Rev. Robert I. Gannon, president Emeritus of Fordham University, began a talk yesterday at the annual breakfast of the Masonic order in New York State.

He was the first Roman Catholic priest to address the yearly gathering, and the Masons enjoyed it, too. There were 5,000 of them in two hotels, the Waldorf-Astoria and the Commodore. Father Gannon spoke first at the Waldorf, then the Commodore, and, at each hotel, he received a standing ovation.

At one point, he remarked that when the late Pope John XXIII called the Second Vatican Council, he did not expect the Masons of the world to join the Knights of Columbus.

"But," Father Gannon added, "I saw in the paper the other day that you have been playing around together. Let me warn you to be on your guard. You may wake up some morning and find that you have joined not only the Knights of Columbus, but the Jesuits."

His reference was to an announcement last month that the Masons and the K. of C. were planning joint, national programs in the "moral, civic and social action fields."

There are about 1.2 million members of the Knights of Columbus in this country and about 4 million Masons. The K. of C. is strictly a Roman Catholic fraternal organization; the Masons accept Protestants

Antagonism between the Masons and the Roman Catholics dates to a papal bull issued in 1738 by Pope Clement XII in which he condemned the Masons on the ground that their beliefs and rituals constituted a false religion. Roman Catholics still face excommunication for joining the Masons.

The Knights of Columbus was founded in 1882 by a Roman Catholic priest, the Rev. Michael McGivney, at a time when secret organizations, such as the Masons, enjoyed great popularity. The Catholic church forbid its members to join them, so they formed their own, now secret fraternity. Today the Masonic order is no longer secret.

Both organizations believe in the ideal of brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God.

Father Gannon, who is now superior of the Jesuit Missions, recalled that both his order and the Masons had been blamed for the Franco-Prussian war, the Dreyfus affair and the assassination of Presidents Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley.

"All in all," he said "we have been two busy little groups linked together by not only antiquity but by iniquity."

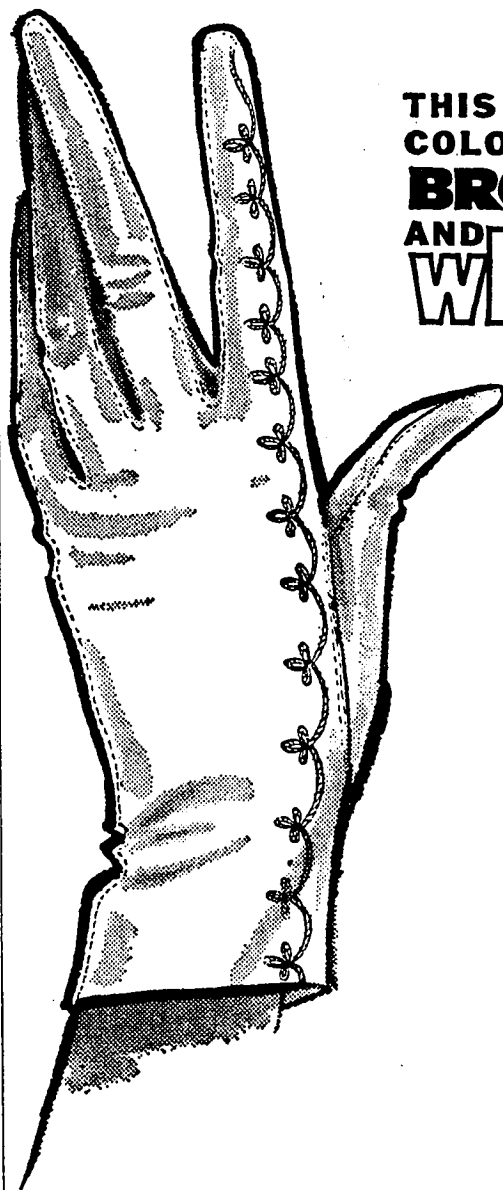
Then, remarking that "the time has come to think big thoughts," Father Gannon defined what he described as this country's "worst enemy."

"In our breathless effort to straighten out the world and be its moral as well as financial leaders," he said, "we find ourselves paralyzed at home by group hate."

"This is America's worst enemy. What is it made of? It is just a garden variety of Catholic fraternal organization; human passion slobbered over with a thick layer of ignorance."
